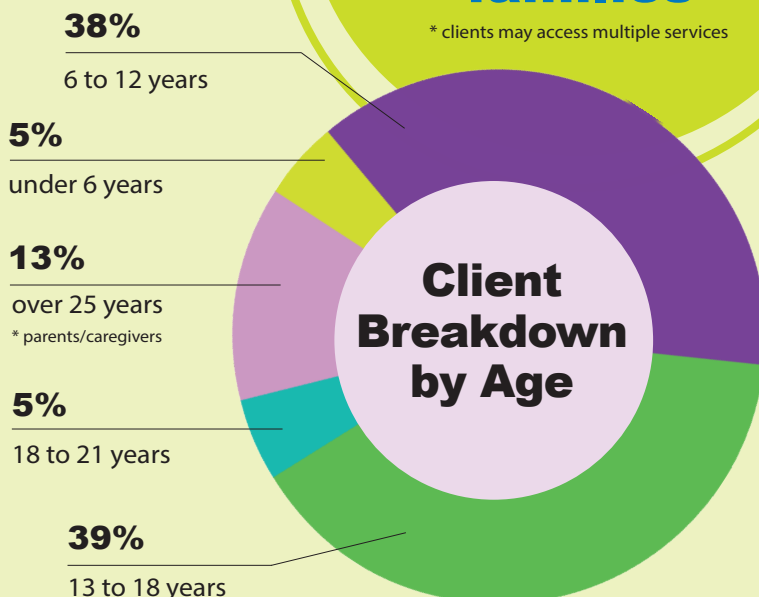
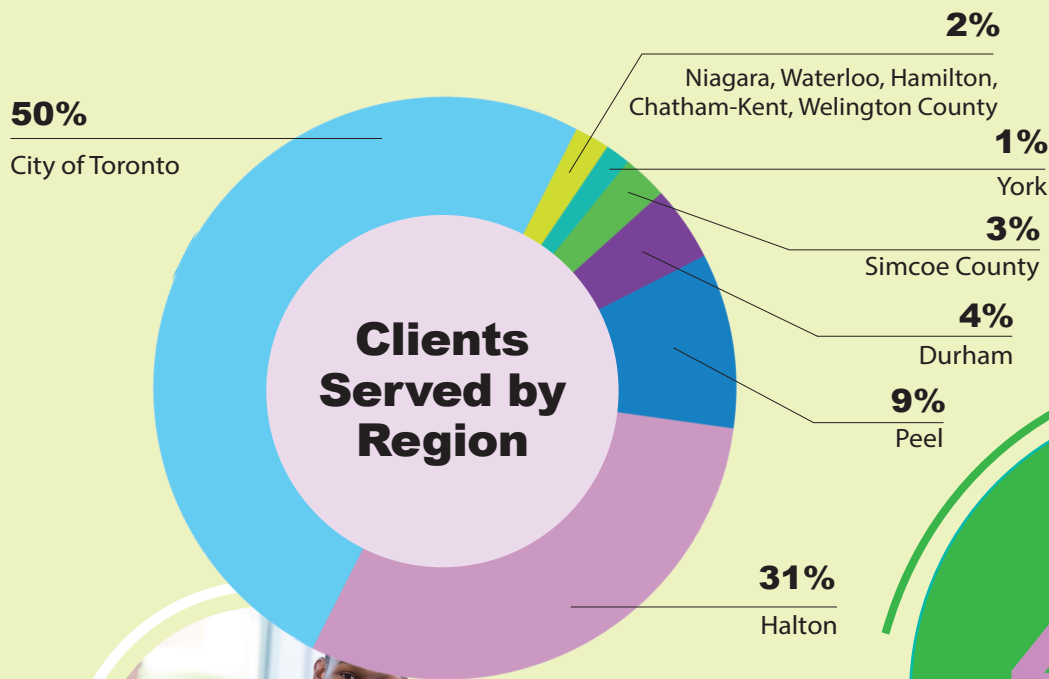

More ways we helped:

- 283 children/youth were referred to Radius in 2017-2018.
- 118 children/youth received individual assessments.
- 193 children/youth received individual treatment.
- 51 children/youth attended one of our group counselling programs (adolescent group and expressive arts based group).
- 87 children/youth received brief service.

More notable achievements:

- Research projects focused on understanding family characteristics of our client groups, long-term impacts of childhood concerning sexual behaviours, mental health outcomes associated with age of sexual victimizations, victimization characteristics and trauma responses, and early predictors of inappropriate sexual behaviours.*
- We implemented a new program evaluation protocol in April 2017 which involved conducting repeated assessments to evaluate individual treatment outcomes. This data continues to be used to inform clinical practices and intervention.
- We continued to evaluate outcomes in short-term therapy groups in 2017-2018. Once sizeable samples are collected, we will use these data to report on the effectiveness of group therapy for children, youth and families/caregivers.
